## 'Make do and Mend'

Over the past few weeks I've been spasmodically 'turning out' cupboards, the latest exploration being the linen cupboard on the landing, whose top shelves are inaccessible except by standing on a chair, and so are rarely inspected. I rediscovered my mother's christening robe [also worn by me], and her white embroidered school pinnies, as well as my gran's 'best' white linen embroidered quilt [how very practical!]

Among these treasures was a small patchwork quilt, made by gran for my first cot, made of small irregular pieces of cotton fabrics. She had clearly used scraps of old shirts and frocks: nothing new, not 'colour-coordinated': she had made 'something out of nothing'.

This early 'recycling' was a regular thing in many households: cotton frocks lengthened with contrasting bands of material, knitted jumpers past their best carefully unravelled, the wool skeined, washed and rewound and re-made into socks or gloves, and oddments of wool left over from other garments knitted into 'stripy' jumpers.

Socks (hand-knitted by gran) were darned, and eventually 're-footed'; missing buttons were replaced (though the 'button box' rarely produced a full matching set: I was once persuaded that 'all different' buttons on a cardigan was the height of fashion).

The present interest in 'crafts' might perhaps wean us from the 'wear once and throw away' attitude: something you have made yourself is surely worth treasuring? Making, as well as mending, seems to be more popular, if the popularity of TV's 'Sewing Bee' is anything to go by. I have to confess that school sewing classes were not my favourite: it took me a year to make an apron for cookery class, all hand-made, hemmed, gathered, bias-bound - and it never fitted properly. In later years however I made many of my own clothes, knowing that even if I used the same paper pattern as several friends, the choice of fabric and trimming would ensure that each garment would be unique.

Maybe in these weeks of unaccustomed leisure some of us are turning to sewing, knitting or crochet? I discovered, in another cupboard, a barely-begun fair-isle pullover: yes, it is ambitious and complicated, but a real challenge, so why not try to finish it? And who knows, our next Veryan Show could include a 'lockdown leisure achievement' class?
