Parish Giving Scheme

Veryan church has now joined the 'Parish Giving' scheme [Ruan had already signed up]/It's a good way of ensuring regular income throughout the year, as our treasurer Carol explains:

Churches always struggle to find the funds to keep open. We raise funds through offertory donations and fund-raising events but some people who don't attend church would also like to contribute to the church.

The Parish Giving Scheme is a way that anyone who would like to donate an amount [the amount and frequency to suit you] can do so in a safe and regular way. It can also be used by church goers to give an amount regularly rather than put something in the offertory when they attend services, and if you feel that it would not be right to attend without putting something in the offertory, tokens are provided by the scheme.

One of the other advantages of the scheme is that if you are able to gift aid your donation, this is automatically collected for the church by PGS.

LATEST GUIDANCE FOR CHURCHES

The House of Bishops has circulated a twelve-page guidance note on 'opening and managing church buildings' dated 19 July.

It requires each church to decide how best to provide a safe environment for congregations and visitors remembering that there are no longer any legal requirements for whatever measures are in place and that each person is responsible for his or her [and others'] safety.

Briefly, the main points seem to be:

We have to remember that there is no longer a legal requirement to comply, and that we would be 'advising' rather than enforcing the law.

While hand sanitisers, face coverings, 'social distancing', and recording names and contacts are no longer mandatory, these guidelines may continue to be applied if the PCC/congregation would feel safer; but people would merely be requested or advised to observe them and that nobody should be asked to leave for non-compliance; each church must decide what would be safe and appropriate for congregation and visitors.

Congregational singing is permitted but it is suggested that masks are worn and than 'singers sit well apart from each other'

Wine may be included in the distribution of Communion [Bishop Philip commends the practice of 'simultaneous administration', where the celebrant dips the wafer into the wine before dropping the wafer into the communicant's hand]. Although allowed, use of the chalice is discouraged.

Service books, leaflets, hymn books etc are not now regarded as major carriers of infection and could probably be left [in pews] until the next week's service.

Ringing can continue as normal, with whatever precautions ringers feel are appropriate.

Churches may now open for visitors, 'groups' and fundraising events, with appropriate risk assessments and safeguards in place.

'Deep cleaning' may be replaced with a more usual approach: the document advises, for wood, glass, stone and metal, using a dilute solution of an organic cleaning material ['Ecover' washing up liquid is recommended] sprayed on a cloth and wiped off with paper towels; on no account use disinfectant 'cleaning wipes'.

All members of Veryan PCC and regular members of the congregation were sent a copy of the document and asked to comment.

The general feeling is that we should 'carry on as we are' for the present; we have managed to cope well so far and are used to the current arrangements.

Fr Doug would also recommend continuing the Communion in one kind only for the time.

Singing will resume but with masks and adequate 'distancing'; there may be some who will wish to sing and others who prefer not to and their choice will of course be respected.

We need to encourage visitors to respect and comply with our usual practices for the sake of everyone.

'Make a joyful noise'?

At last we are able to sing in church.

Rev'd John Fraser in a recent 'Spectator' article wrote:

"The leadership of the Church of England has been depressingly silent in defence of singing..

[sacrificing] the worship— of the Church for general public safety - perhaps an expression of their obsessive desire to be seen to be compliant with any...expression of safeguarding ..."

He believes that worship "is most effectively done with heart and voice".

What dom you think? Are you happy to sing again?

Change for change's sake?

A recent mailing from the Truro branch of the Prayer Book Society contains a thoughtful comment from its chairman, Revd Hilary Spong, on the current proposals for changes in our diocese.

"The expected changes would seem to reflect more the reorganisation of our boundaries and territories to bring numbers of stipended clergy into 0 line with the money available to pay for them, and to disperse the responsibility for acquiring that finance to local deaneries, rather than a central Diocesan administration. I have no doubt that this is a change that is necessary, but we must be aware that in the greater scheme of things, this is not seen as a ticket to radically alter services and churchmanship, or dispense with familiar ways of worship... Change is inevitable and oft-times healthy, but babies and bathwater come to mind..."

CHILDHOOD REVISITED

Shelagh's invitation to 'bring out your toys' for the exhibition in Veryan church later this month inspired me to remember some of my childhood companions. Most of them have long since departed, some handed on to younger cousins, others sent at Christmas. along with books, to Dr Barnardo's, some simply worn out.

Wartime was difficult for parents of young children.

Few toys were available and many were made in Germany so not in favour [many clockwork toys and most of the best china dolls, as well as 'posh' teddy bears]. 'Hand-medowns' were eagerly received: I certainly played with my Aunt Dorothy's dolls' pram, a model from the mid-1920s, and several dolls, probably formerly my cousin Pamela's.

Dad was in the army but managed to find and send a teddy bear [she is still my constant companion]. A second bear, Rupert, arrived when I was about six, with of course a 'Rupert' annual.

Dad also made a dolls' cot, a miniature blackboard and easel, and a small wooden wheelbarrow painted in regimental colours. The cot was a Christmas = present in about 1945, and came complete with lifesize china 'baby doll' with eyes that opened and

closed, clad in a pink 'pram suit' knitted by my mother and gran, and cosy under little blankets and a small patchwork quilt. China dolls were surely not made to be played with; she fell off a chair and had to be mended by Dad with glue, and ever after to wear a woollen bonnet to hide the scars.


Stuffed animals included an elephant called Jumbo' [this was pre-Disney's 'Dumbo'], an unlikely giraffe and a woolly lamb, but it was the two Teds who have really shared my life and my thoughts and fears.

Books were sources of wonder for an only child and imaginary 'friends' included characters from stories as well as the unlikely and entirely imaginary pair of 'Dr Pullover' who apparently lived 'over Trethennal Gate' and 'Miss Gillespie' - maybe an acquaintance of gran or Auntie Olive? Des will remember 'playing shops' or 'houses' in gran's shed, and, when we were a bit older, evenings at Hawthorne Cottage

playing 'brag' or 'nap' for matchsticks.

Winter evenings were spent reading, knitting [I was taught to knit very young] or playing Ludo or Snakes and Ladders. 'Lexicon' was more to my liking and must have helped with spelling and vocabulary. I can remember being taught various forms of 'patience' with playing cards ['elevens' and 'fifteens'] in the vain hope that it might improve my mental arithmetic...

Sarah organised a contingent from the Roseland Choir, bearing in mind that they hadn't sung together for months, and they were hastily rehearsed three days before by their Director and organist Martin Davis. Our Church Warden David got a day off 'wardening' to sing in the choir, a much needed male voice, so Sue stood in- another job for her!

I'm sure you all know that Gilbert has ants in his pants and cannot sit still for two minutes, even to enjoy himself. Determined that her adopted Grandpa and Grandma were to be present at the wedding I told Ellie Gilbert would fidget unless we gave him a job. He was therefore appointed car park attendant. With approximately 50 cars expected in the village he set to. He has a private stash of bollards, he spoke with the Hall, (bless them)and worked out that he could get 28 cars into the Hall car park as long as none of them needed to leave in a hurry.
