Together, Will and John blend nostalgic Cornish folk songs with intricate foot tapping instrumentals, leaving audiences both amazed and touched. This really will be an evening to remember.

Remembering...

Our news nowadays is full of concern for our changing climate, the loss of habitats and wildlife, species once plentiful now endangered: what is happening to our world? I look back to a childhood in the 1950s, and am dismayed at so many creatures and plants no longer common.

Among the many books in my house is a set of three, presents at Christmas 1950, called 'The Shown Series', written especially for children, describing and depicting Flowers, Butterflies and Moths, and Birds. They were a valued gift and I made good use of them.

My mother was especially interested in identifying wild flowers [they stayed still, unlike birds and moths]. We explored the lanes and the fields around Tregavarras [and the weeds in the garden] together. We discovered such oddly named delights as tormentil, sneezewort, mouse-eared chickweed and knotty figwort - memorable then and still identifiable today. At ten years old you remember so much information...

In those days we picked specimens, pressed them between sheets of blotting paper under piles of books, and stuck them into albums with a note of the name and when and where we found them.

I still look at the hedges when I'm out walking, and thrill at the first stitchworts or the early may blossom, but many of the once familiar - and the rarer - plants seem to have disappeared. The hedge at Penvergate, just up the road from Portluney, was every March white with sweet white violets. For years now I have looked in vain. Straythe used to be a reliable source of primroses: does anyone now remember Pamela's carefully arranged 'Christ is Risen' in golden primroses set in damp moss in the porch of Trewartha chapel at Easter?

The 'Shown' bird book included pictures of the better known birds. It was a challenge to identify them all, but at Tregavarras we had fields, hedges, woods and the coast, with a good variety of 'feathered friends'. For a number of years however even the once familiar varieties lave been largely absent; a missel thrush used regularly to nest in Gran's ash tree, there were treecreepers in Veryan churchyard, yellowhammers at Four Turnings, and nests galore in Sentry Lane. At Camels when I was very young we occasionally heard the extraordinary churring song of the nightjar. There were fulmars, kittiwakes, terns all along the coast, turnstones and little plovers on Portluney beach. And when did you last hear a cuckoo?


Dad seemed to be able to identify any bird by its appearance or by its song. I suppose that working in the carpenter's shop at Caerhays, just below the main drive, he would hear birdsong all day long, not only the familiar domestic varieties but rare migrants. We would sometimes make the effort to get up and out in an early spring morning to hear the dawn chorus, Dad sending the results to, I think, Brian Vesey Fitzgerald, then a regular on Children's Hour [do you remember 'Nature Parliament'?] A couple of years after I had been given my 'Shown' books my mother made a rare expedition to Truro [a day's journey there and back from the remoteness of Tregavarras]. She had noticed in the 'West Briton' an advertisement for Mr Glover's second hand bookshop in Ferris Town which listed 'Morris's British Birds, 8 volumes, hand coloured plates, £5' and determined to get the set for Dad.


That was a huge amount of money: nearly a week's wages, but she was a thrifty soul and knew how much he would appreciate the books. He was delighted and horrified at the same time, but read, and re-read them constantly. We were able to identify the rarer birds not in my little volume, and the illustrations are superb. I still have the set, 'heirlooms' now I suppose.


And what about 'Butterflies and Moths'? Apparently this year has been the most disastrous for these beautiful creatures 'since records began'. The orange tip, always the first in spring, was missing this year. Our buddleia bush used to be alive with red admirals, peacocks, tortoishells, painted ladies, commas..I've hardly seen any this year. And while I am relieved not to have to rescue suicidal moths from the lights on summer evenings, I can't remember when I last saw the hawk moths which used regularly to be busy in the front garden.

Do today's children walk the lanes to look for the first violets, make poppy 'dolls' or daisy chains? Do they marvel at the fragile beauty of a butterfly's wing? Do they watch a wren or a blue tit dive into a hedge with a beak full of food for their brood? I hope so: if we are aware of the beauty of our natural world we are surely more likely to look after it.

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News from Veryan Players

You may remember 'the play that got away'? Over two years ago, at the point of dress rehearsal with the stage set, we were thwarted by lockdown. Not to be beaten, we love the play so much we are in rehearsal again! We have some cast changes, and we are very pleased to welcome several new people into Veryan Players.

"Hell Fire Corner" by D.M.Thomas is set in a mining community in Cornwall at the beginning of the twentieth century, and explores the hardship and difficulties faced by people living and working in those difficult conditions.

Against this background of hardship emerge the themes of community, and the relief and pleasure found through singing and rugby. We follow the life of Jack, as he struggles to provide for his family, and Jack's hero, Bert Solomon.

Bert was a real person, a local working class lad from Redruth, whose skill and expertise in rugby eventually took him to Twickenham where he played for England.



Three November saints

Saint Cecilia

was a Roman virgin martyr and is venerated in Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican and some Lutheran churches. In spite of Cecilia taking a vow of virginity, her parents forced her to marry a pagan nobleman named Valerian. During the wedding, as the musicians played Cecilia "sang in her heart to the Lord".

By the sixteenth century she had become the patron saint of music and musicians.

Many musical compositions are dedicated to her, and her feast, on 22 November, is often chosen as a

day for concerts and music festivals. Cecilia is frequently depicted playing the viola, a small



organ or other musical instrument.

St Hilda

lived in seventh century Northumberland, and founded the abbey of Whitby which in the tradition of the Celtic church was a double monastery for men and women and which was renowned for the high standard of its teaching.



Her life is recorded by the Venerable Bede in his Ecclesiastical History. Her feast day is 17 November.



St Minver church on the north Cornish coast is dedicated to

Saint Menefreda, one of the 24 children of Brychan who tradition says came to Cornwall from Wales in the fifth century. Among her sisters were Endelienta, Mabyn and Teath, all of whom have local churches or chapels dedicated to them. Memefreda settled at Tredresick near Padstow, and lived an austere life there in her little cell. One day, while she was combing her hair beside her holy well, the Devil appeared to her and tried to molest her. However, she threw her comb at him forcing him to descend into Hell through Lundy Hole which miraculously appeared just in time.

Her feast day is 24 November.

Veryan WI

Members and three visitors enjoyed a fascinating illustrated talk by Lynn Goold of Fowey at their October meeting. Lynn has walked the pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela in Spain - the Way of St James - and studied it for many years. We learnt of the many pilgrim routes across mainland Europe and Scandinavia, as well as the beginning of the route here in Cornwall, Padstow to Fowey, where in mediaeval times boats of pilgrims left for the nect stage south through France. The pilgrims' overnight resting place remains in Fowey to this day as the oldest building in the town.


