

There is a saying, "The only constant is change", and the PCC is considering how to maintain that constancy by making the church building viable and fit for purpose in the 21st century, making it work for our community. One way is to make a few changes to the interior to provide a warm, user- friendly, welcoming environment which will have a positive influence on personal well-being for all ages.

With the support and advice of the Diocesan Advisory Committee we are starting by looking at the provision of a kitchen, toilet, and storeroom. We also want to update the vestry, and provide a multi-purpose welfare/children's play area space. We are at the very early stages of this exciting project, which Carol Hughes is heading up, and we will keep you posted, so watch this space.....!




